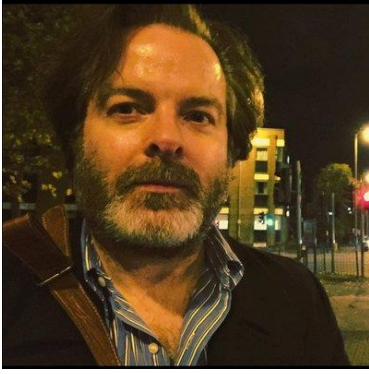
Booking



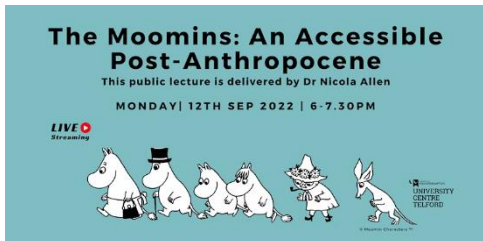
Helen Keller is a well-known figure in popular culture, she was a deaf-blind woman who promoted education for students with sight and hearing loss and was heralded as a child-wonder who ‘overcame’ her disabilities. However, she was also a political campaigner who fought for disability rights to be regarded alongside gender, sexuality, class and race as politically infused categories. This talk explores the politics of a woman often remembered more as a saint and less as a political being and

uncovers some of the material that the FBI held on her.

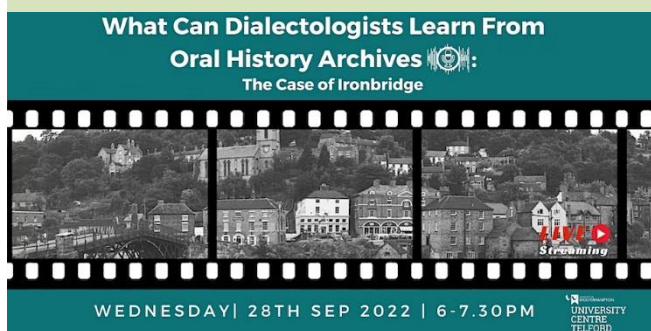

With roots in the likes of Truman Capote’s *In Cold Blood*, and some publications further back still, it appears this grizzly genre is something that has attracted audiences for nearing a century – despite any moral ambiguities around the works’ contents. Here, Dr Charley Barnes, Lecturer in Creative and Professional Writing from University of Wolverhampton will discuss the (in)accuracies of the True Crime genre to consider how the “truth” is represented to a reader, and whether consumers need to be made more aware of the fictions behind their favourite criminal facts.

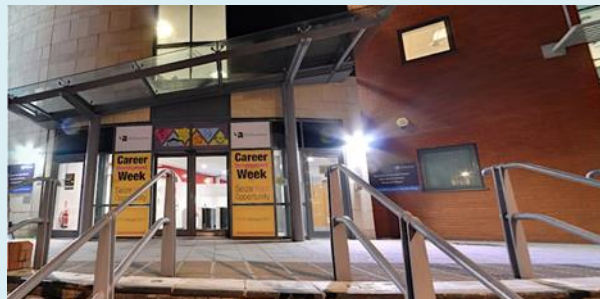

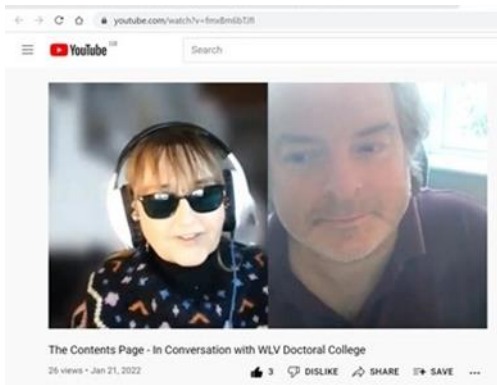
Tedx Wolverhampton 2022 Theme: Mirror, Signal, Manoeuvre

This workshop is the first of two on 'Introduction to Copyright'. The first session focuses on copyright considerations in the context of publishing while the second session focuses on copyright issues in secondary data use.

Copyright is an area of scholarly communications that affects every researcher at some stage of their academic career. Engaging with copyright is therefore crucial to any involvement in both publishing and teaching, affecting individuals, and potentially the reputation of the institution.

The first session will introduce attendees to the brief origins of copyright with a focus on copyright considerations in both publishing and teaching. By the end of the session, attendees will have a better understanding of different terms and licences available for publishing in different formats.


Level: Introductory

Experience/knowledge required: None

Target audience: Researchers/anyone interested in copyright considerations in publishing and teaching

We will be using Mentimeter to ask questions in this workshop so you may benefit from having a second device ready for this, such as a smartphone.

The past two years has involved a huge change in expectations for researchers in how they manage and share participants’ information. There are new legal obligations, such as the new GDPR regulations, as well as a greater emphasis in sharing data after the completion of a research project.

The process of anonymisation is an essential part to protect the identities of research participants while complying with these ethical and legal standards. Before sharing, archiving, or publishing data, you should ensure that all identifying and disclosive information is managed appropriately and redacted when necessary.

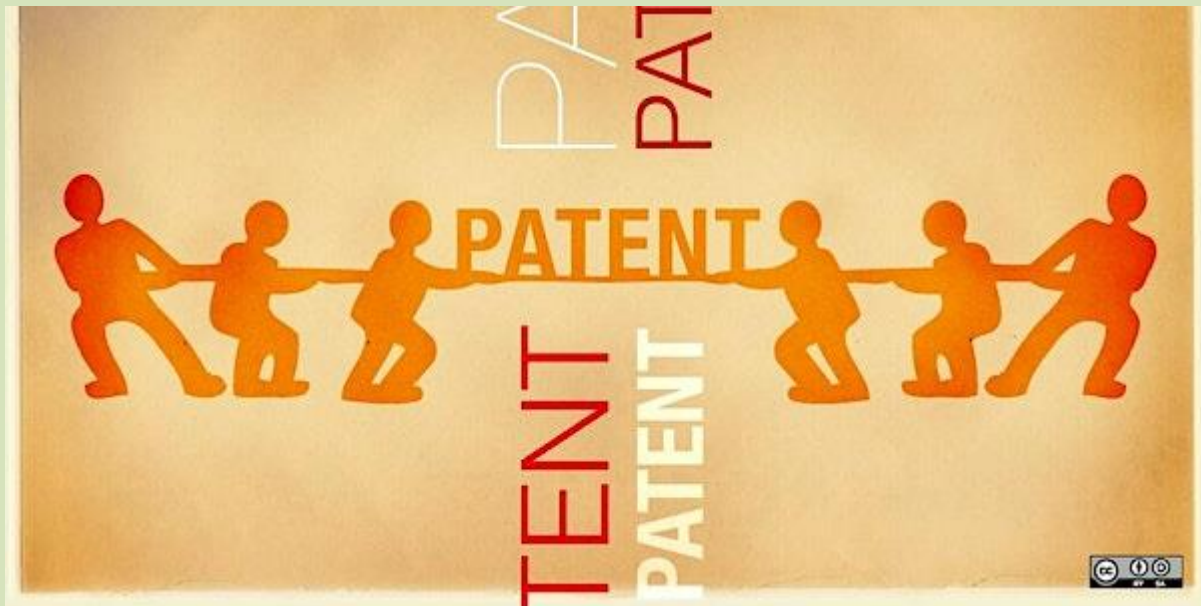

Innovation – A road less travelled...

How do we create an innovation ecosystem that offers equal opportunities, getting over barriers like gender and geography?



Dr Desai is a Consultant Obstetrician and Gynaecologist at New Cross, Wolverhampton since 2009. She is the Gynaecology Risk Lead (Wolverhampton) which can be a challenging job in the post-pandemic period. Dr Desai has an interest in Clinical Coding and quality of healthcare data as a good measurement that can guide improvement. Her innovative research in retained surgical items during childbirth and surgery has resulted in a successful patent application, with the UK Intellectual Property Office (filed in 2018). Her innovative research attracts external funding - recently she has received two highly competitive national grants: (1) Innovate UK Smart Grant and (2) Biomedical Catalyst Grant towards collaborative projects (£760k). Keele University and Wolverhampton University Science in Industry Research Centre (SIRC) have been instrumental in the initial R&D.

Dr Desai is also a Senior Clinical Examiner for MBChB examinations at Birmingham University and a College tutor for postgraduate trainees at New Cross. Dr Desai is a graduate of Mumbai University (1995), and her MD research focused on foetal growth centiles (2000). Moreover, Dr Desai explored human factors/ergonomics in PG Cert at Loughborough University which now gives her unique insight into designing good systems and encouraging human behaviour when aiming to providing better care.

Dr Desai has spent a large part of her childhood in a small Indian village, which is now reflected in her activities in the community. Dr Desai is an active member of a wonderful charity that provides education and accommodation to underprivileged girls in that same Indian village. She is convinced there is amazing talent and potential in unlikely places.

The likability of a leader, colleague, and person in general, in a similar way to physical attractiveness (like it or not) can imbue people with "The Halo Effect" (Thorndike) - a bias where if you are "liked" on initial meeting, you are also presumed to have other positive traits, and you are also more readily forgiven when things go wrong. While I can fully appreciate this is very much a "game" played at work - I do often tell my students "Hard Skills get you through the door; Soft Skills keep you in the job." Of course I would always advocate working on the technical skills, one cannot (and ought not) rely on "personality" alone, but emotional intelligence certainly helps.

This webinar will explore how stress can affect our emotional responses and practical ways in which we can build our mental and emotional strength so that we can not only take challenge in our stride, but do so in good grace too.

In a time of fraught ecological and climate debates, when culture, community and communication lean further and further into digital landscapes, new models of meaning-making are required. Geo-poetics offers an active interdisciplinarity that bridges the infamous gulfs between the scientific and poetic frameworks, allowing it to better investigate the hyper-object of climate change and to reconfigure truth-seeking apparatus. It seeks to re-establish the connections of human and more than human and re-ground the self in “earthness”, developing what Kenneth White called “Topological Presence”. In doing so, we revitalise the important deep time connections between being and landscape - escaping the spectral traps of online life.

In this hybrid lecture-poetry reading, Dr R. M. Francis will discuss how we read and write texts that are enabled by the earth sciences, how we reconfigure our sense of place in-light of deep-time, geological and ecological concerns, and contemplate the mental and physical health benefits of geo-poetic wayfinding. In exploring the yogic and shamanic in this method, Francis tracks his poetics during his time as Poet in Residence for the Black Country Geological Society, producing his film poem and book, *The Chain Coral Chorus* (Playdead Press, March 2023): using pilgrimage, wayfinding and the Earth Sciences to get to the bedrock of place-identity.

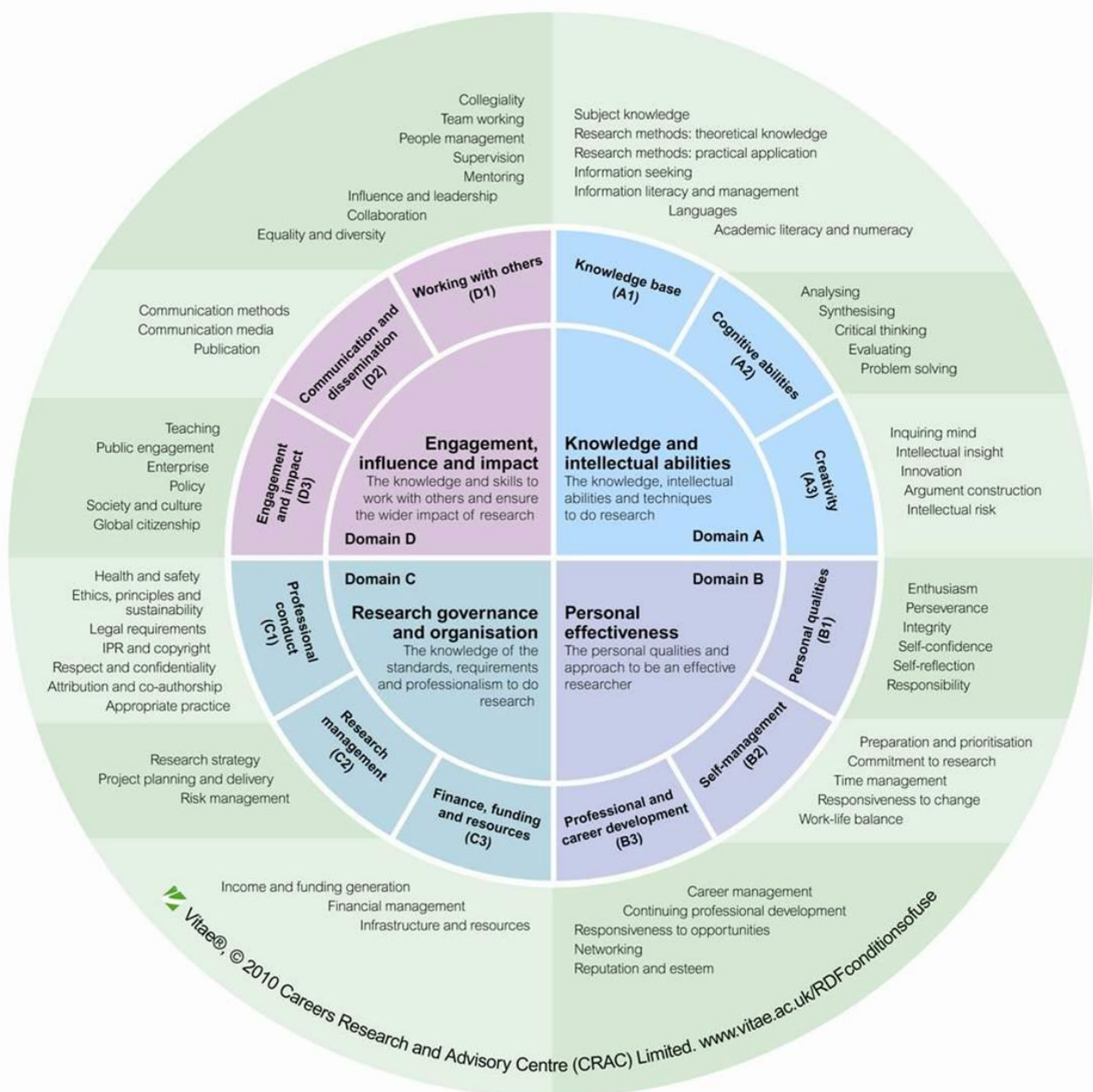

About the Researcher Development Framework (RDF)



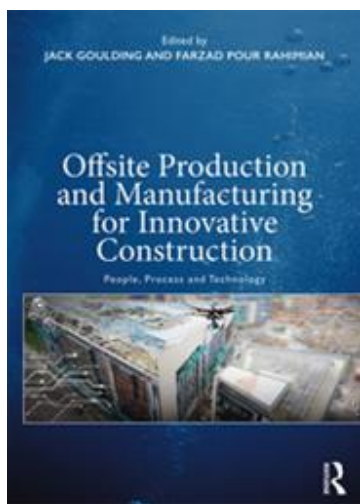
The Researcher Development Statement (RDS) sets out the knowledge, behaviours and attributes of effective and highly skilled researchers appropriate for a wide range of careers. The RDS is for policy makers and research organisations which provide personal, professional and career development for researchers in higher education. The Researcher Development Statement is derived from the Researcher Development Framework (RDF), a major new approach to researcher development, which aims to enhance our capacity to build the UK workforce, develop world-class researchers and build our research base.



The University of Wolverhampton subscribes to the Vitae Research Development Framework. The RDF is structured in four domains encompassing the knowledge, intellectual abilities, techniques and professional standards to do research, as well as the personal qualities, knowledge and skills to work with others and ensure the wider impact of research. Within each of the domains are three sub-domains and associated descriptors, which describe different aspects of being a researcher.

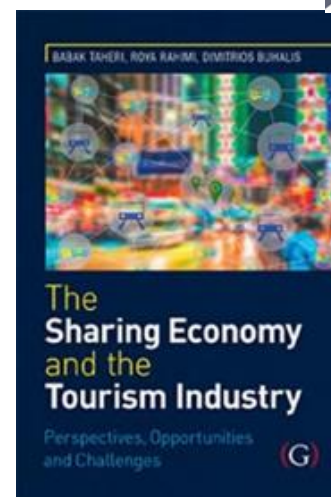

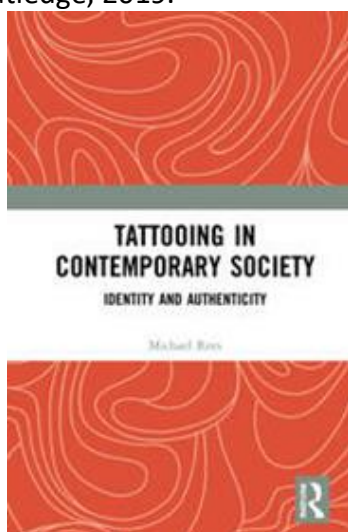

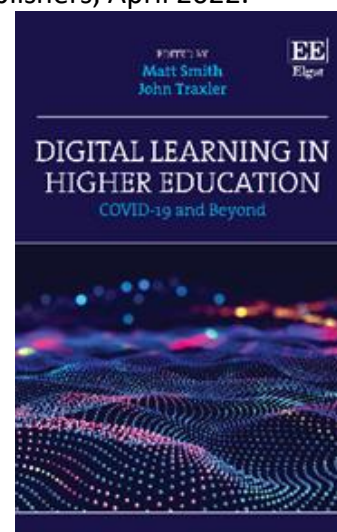
